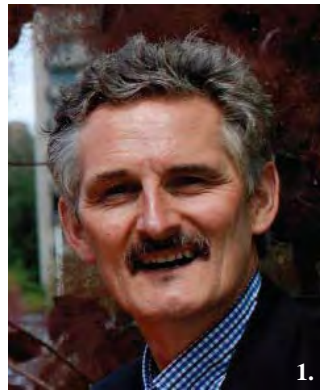

LETTER FROM THE WORLD SUBUD ASSOCIATION CHAIR

2010 was the year of defining directions for the World Subud Association and the new World Subud Council with a new WSA Chair and executive alongside the affiliate chairs and other members of the council. We began where our predecessors under Osanna



Vaughn as Chairlady had left off, by listening to the Subud membership and understanding the needs of their international organization and by continuing the focus of building strongly on what we inherited at the 13th World Congress in Christchurch, New Zealand.

During the last days of the World Congress, I laid out five key ideas for the years ahead. These are building on what we have; renewing our commitment to enterprise; building a more transparent, professional organization with improved governance; supporting our expanded presence in the world through our communities and centers projects; building stronger financial foundations for the work of Subud in the world and of course working towards a successful 2014 Congress.

At the World Subud Council meeting in Great Malvern, England, priorities were defined as: refocusing on enterprise; WSA archives as a major project; developing our Subud communities; developing stronger finances and a new fundraising model. A way forward to bring Subud into the world's awareness also presented itself at this meeting. In addition, my key ideas from World Congress were reinforced.

Improved communications facilitates our work as we are regularly in contact with each other building a deeper sense of connection. The newly rejuvenated board of directors, which includes eight Zone Representatives and myself, 'teleconference' regularly as do the various board sub-committees, as necessary.

For me 2010 was a whirlwind of visits. I travelled to 12 countries in Europe, The Americas and Australasia in the course of the year. I visited South America for the first time and was profoundly moved by the deep sincerity and good humour of the Subud members there.

I am deeply humbled by the magnitude and the possibilities inherent in what God places before us. I understand my role to be that of helping open the way ahead, of being a channel. I am also fully engaged in the oversight of the policy and operations of the organization in all its aspects. I continue to thank God for this opportunity to serve you all and pray for his blessings on all our collaborative work and worship together.

TWO MAJOR EVENTS OF 2010

The largest event in 2010 was World Subud Association's 14th World Congress in Christchurch, New Zealand, from the 4th to the 18th of January 2010. There were 1648 official World Congress registrations. As usual members flocked from all around the world; although unfortunately no members or delegates from the Democratic Republic of Congo were able to be present because their visas were declined.

The congress took place in two main areas: the first included the City Town Hall with its 2500 seat auditorium, where opening and closing ceremonies, the classical concert and Fashionation 2010 took place and Ibu Siti Rahayu Wiryohudoyo, Subud's spiritual guide, offered talks. The beautiful James Haye Theatre hosted plenary meetings and smaller cultural performances. Across the road and a sky bridge away was the convention centre providing large halls for spiritual activities, that is, latihan and testing sessions, as well as a multi-disciplinary exhibition area filled with colourful presentations on various social and other projects, enterprises, artworks and more. Next door the Salvation Army premises, with its lovely 400 seat auditorium, hosted smaller presentations and Congress TV. Congress TV was a much appreciated follow up from the first efforts during the Innsbruck World Congress in 2005. A small team managed to film, edit and send images (including Ibu Rahayu's talks) to 68 locations around the world from the TV website within 24 to 48 hours, providing members who could not attend an immediate congress experience. This resulted in 25,000 visits to the site during the month of January.



The second major venue was the Unlimited College, an architecturally avant-garde space dedicated to the various WSA affiliates social, cultural, health and entrepreneurial activities and meetings.

The favourite evening hangout was the Caledonian Hall close by, where dinners, an internet cafe, dance performances and parties were attended by young and old alike.

The city of Christchurch and the New Zealanders' hospitality made us feel very much at home. The opening ceremony began with a traditional Māori welcome by the local Ngāi Tahu tribe to the Subud 'tribe'. Staff members from the various venues were outstandingly helpful and cooperative and we were happy to have the presence of many members of the general public at our performances and exhibitions.

The congress was organized in two parts, the delegate congress proper took place over the first 10 days, with reports, working parties, discussions, votes and the election of the new international officers (see list on page 4). The last four days of congress witnessed a gathering program including a myriad of workshops, presentations and cultural activities organized by the various wings, affiliates and individual members. Parallel to this the first ever WSA Forums added an extra dimension to the already extraordinary atmosphere with each forum looking at current themes of interest to humanity: Subud and Science, Sustainability, Interfaith/Inter-spirituality, Subud and the UN and a New Economy. The WSA and members may further develop this leading up to the 2014 World Congress.



Following presentations and proposals from Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Mexico and Norway, the city of Puebla, in Mexico was chosen as the location for the next Subud World Congress in 2014.

A full and detailed report and hand book was created by the New Zealand Congress Organizing Team and will be available for future teams to consult.

The second major event of the year was the Subud Britain Gathering 2010 in Great Malvern in August, which hosted the World Subud Council meeting at the same



time. The site was the perfect venue for this type of gathering and it is encouraging to see the number of third and fourth generation Subud children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Approximately 650 members attended the meeting, mostly from Great Britain, but again with many visitors from abroad.

The World Subud Council had its first meeting as the incoming team. Long working days left little space for relaxing; still meal times were mostly taken with the gathering attendees giving the opportunity for the council to interact with the members.

ABOUT SUBUD

The main purposes of the Subud organization are to serve the members and to facilitate the development of Subud and its mission. It provides services to Subud members such as gatherings, talks of Bapak and Rahayu, our spiritual guides, Subud houses, helper visits, publications, web sites and access to and support for networks of Subud members. It also constitutes a set of vehicles through which Subud members can act together to further the aims of Subud and to express in the form of activities, programs and projects our shared inner experience.

The Subud association is made up of people from different religions, beliefs, nationalities and cultures united by a common, yet individual, spiritual practice known as the latihan. Through this practice, each person may discover his or her own inner nature, potential, talent and guidance in accordance with their individual capacity and commitment. The association encourages the expression of each individual's spirituality working through ones true talent, which gives rise to a diverse range of social, cultural, entrepreneurial, and educational activities.

The founder of Subud, Muhammad Subuh Sumohadiwidjojo, affectionately known as 'Bapak', was born in Indonesia in 1901 and died in 1987. Today Pak Subuh's daughter, Ibu Siti Rahayu Wiryohudoyo, continues to give talks about the spiritual path of Subud to members, much in the fashion that her father did.

World Subud Association Zones And Countries

There are 54 official World Subud Association member countries, with the latihan being practiced in an additional 29 countries.

Relying on news from Zone Representatives and National Committees, there were 20 National Congresses held in countries around the world, fewer than usual due to World Congress occurring in the same year. It was also reported that new National Committee members were chosen in 16 countries with existing committees continuing in their roles in several other countries.



Zone Council Meetings provide communications and mutual support and conduct business on behalf of the geographic area represented as well as business for the international association. These meetings are often the occasion for a gathering of Subud members. These councils are chaired by the Zone Representative and consist of each country's chairperson, committee councillor as well as two kejiwaan (spiritual) councillors selected from the group of National Councillors or Helpers. Four Zone Council meetings took place this year with Zone 8, representing Central and South America, holding their meeting in Colombia at Amanecer in April. Zone 4, covering East Europe, North Asia and

part of the Middle East, held their meeting in July in Villnius, Lithuania. Zone 3 covers Western Europe and held its meeting in August in Great Malvern in the UK directly preceding the World Subud Council, (WSC) meeting at the same venue. Finally, Zone 9, covering Latin America South, held its meeting in Florianopolis, Brazil, in November.

WSA Communications

The WSA published three newsletters sharing news from member countries and on an array of WSA activities as well as keeping the membership current on official international affairs. They were translated into Spanish, French, Indonesian and Russian. We continued supporting distribution of the MSF and SDIA e-newsletters, delivering them widely through the WSA worldwide email distribution list. As each talk of Ibu Rahayu, Subud's spiritual guide, becomes officially transcribed and translated it is distributed to all WSA member countries, as is other news and information of interest or importance. WSA began work on an improved database and continued to update official websites such as subud.com, subud.org and Subud World News with news, information, reports, events and international and national contacts. Subud.com was translated into seven languages. A virtual office provides a resource for those working on behalf of the association with storage of easily accessible official documents. The Subud library [www.subudlibrary.net] contains over 1,700 talks, audio tapes, books and articles by Bapak, Ibu Rahayu, and others with translations in ten languages.

At the World Congress a Memorandum of Understanding was signed between the WSA and the Muhammad Subuh Foundation, Subud's foundation working on behalf of the long-term aims of the association. The MOU creates closer cooperation and mutual support between the two bodies and further strengthens their working relationship and commonalities.

To provide better international communication, a seeding budget of \$4000 was established for official WSA written translations and to subsidize interpreters for World Subud Council meetings and eventually World Congress. A very active Spanish translations team working on Bapak's and Rahayu's talks headed by Elisa Sanchez Caballero from Argentina formulated a four-year work plan. The goal is to publish 20 volumes before the 2014 World Congress; meantime translations and distribution of the talks continues with regular postings on the Subud library and via the Spanish speakers mailing list as moderated by Victor Carballo.

World Subud Council Meetings

The World Subud Council (WSC) is the body that conducts business between World Congresses. The outgoing and incoming councils met during the World Congress in January to work on the council transition and to identify congress business needing implementation. The new council met in August in the UK to advance working relationships and to continue the business of congress. Highlights of the meetings included signing an MSF-Susila Dharma International Association (SDIA) MOU,



granting the R.D. Congo \$15,000 for their first Subud Hall, further developing certain programs/activities such as the WSA Archives, the Wisma Subud Heritage Protection Plan, the WSA Organization Work Group, identifying 'lessons learned' from World Congress, setting aside a reserve of \$150,000 for the next world congress and creating a WSA translations budget for the first time., The amazing variety of affiliate activities was presented, many of which are shared in this report, fostering support and participation from the council.

WSA Directors

In 2010 a deeper foundation for the Board of Directors was developed during a capacity building workshop at the council meeting facilitated by Grahame Pitts, a professional in the field. Maxwell Fraval, WSA Executive Chair, reviewed legal duties and responsibilities of directors. Lessons learned by previous WSA boards and areas of concern were identified along with areas for action. Looking toward policy development, the directors formed sub-committees on topics such as WSA finance, archives, MSF trustee selection and WSA external relations. Regular board conference calls were established.

WSA Executive

At the World Congress the vote was taken to change the name of the International Subud Committee (ISC) to WSA Executive which is in fact ISC's function. Luke Penseny, a mining consultant from Canada, was elected the new WSA Chairman, and Maxwell Fraval, an osteopath living in Australia, was elected as WSA Executive Chairman. Maya Bernardes/Korzybska living in Indonesia and Julia Hurd from the U.S. continue as WSA Executive Vice-Chair and WSA Secretary. Silvana Caradoc Evans from the UK joined the team as WSA Executive Administrator and lives in Australia. Hammond Peek from New Zealand took on the role of WSA Treasurer and Elwyn Waugh from the UK is WSA's Accountant.

Latihan Support

The World Subud Association (WSA) places priority on latihan support, appointing and funding eighteen persons who are experienced in the latihan to support and assist members around the world in following the exercise. The word latihan derives from an Indonesian term that, loosely translated, means exercise.



Eighteen 'helpers' or spiritual assistants, six from each Subud geographic area, were appointed during the World Congress. For Area 1: Isti Da Silva and Pak Widarbo (Indonesia); An Dien Madden and Luqman Harris (Australia); Renata Peek (New Zealand); Amarjit Singh (Malaysia). For Area 2: Elisabeth Bammel (Portugal); Dorinda Johnson and Hamish Barker (UK); Ragna Valli (Finland); Hassan Czwiertnia (Austria); Lawrence Leetz (Holland). For Area 3: Elaina Dodson (USA); Grace Hodgson and Hamilton Schragen (Canada); Daniela Urrutia and Reynaldo Mosquera (Colombia); Manuel Urrejola González (Chile).

These international helpers made a total of 47 visits to 15 countries during 2010. In addition, 22 members became lifetime helpers in the following countries: Singapore, United Kingdom, USA, Hungary, and Canada.

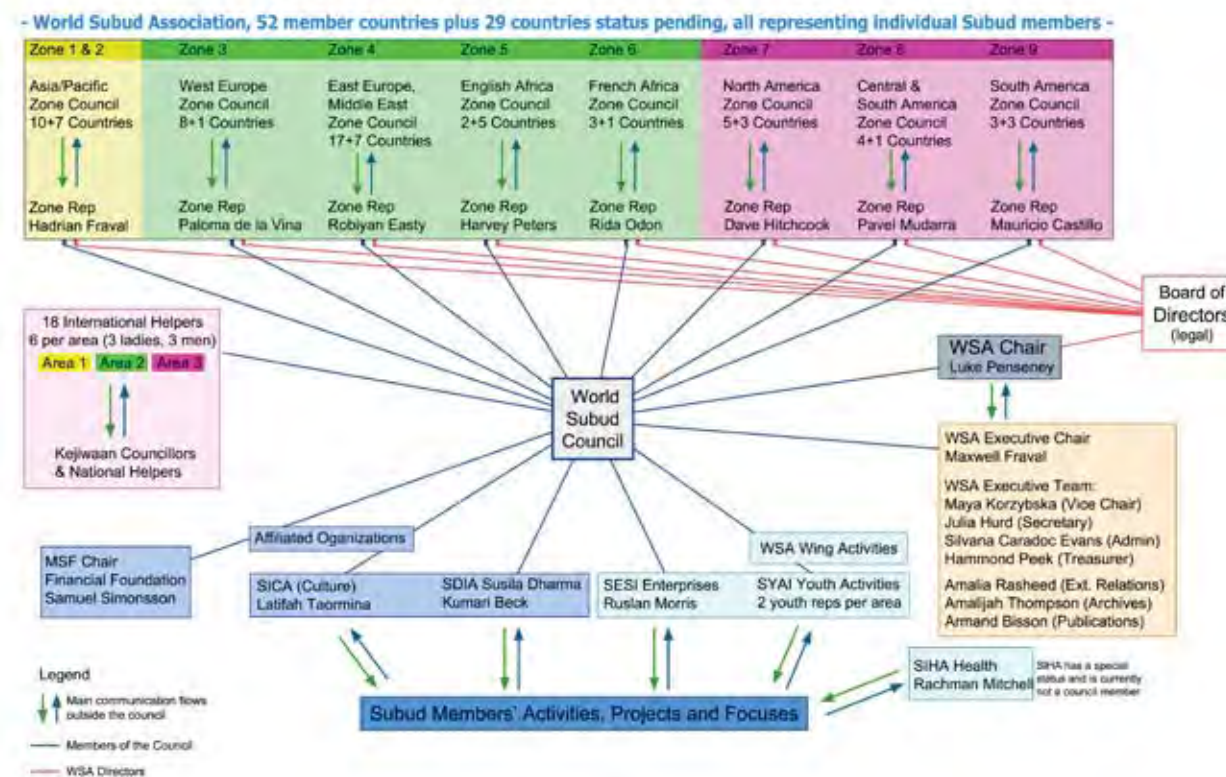
SUSILA DHARMA INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION (SDIA)

Susila Dharma can be interpreted to mean "guided from within to take action in the world".

In the SDI Association, national organizations and social projects give direction to the Board and Office. A key event in 2010 was the Subud World Congress at which SDIA held its annual members meeting and AGM. During congress a rich program of workshops was delivered by more than 50 Susila Dharma (SD) member-representatives and volunteer resource people from around the world. During the AGM Kumari Beck from Canada was elected as the new chairperson. Kumari has a long-standing involvement with SDIA as a Board member from 1993 - 2005 and chairperson from 2001 - 2005.

SDIA and the Muhammad Subuh Foundation (MSF) signed a memorandum of understanding that outlined the terms of cooperation between the two organizations

in support of SD Social and Humanitarian Projects. This arrangement permitted MSF to support two priority projects of the SD Network.

SDIA assisted donors to respond to calls for emergency relief for the earthquake in Chile, devastating floods in Pakistan and the eruption of Mt. Merapi in Indonesia. A total of \$19,874 USD was raised in 2010 for disaster relief.

In 2010 seven e-News newsletters full of information about the SD network were distributed in English, French and Spanish. This year, Hillel Natanson joined the SDIA Communications team as a volunteer coordinating the Facebook page and photo-database.

The SDIA budget for 2010 was \$267,700 for direct support of social and humanitarian projects, training and capacity building, volunteering, UN representation, research and publications, among other activities. SDIA's Endowment Fund was generously supported by donors to the amount of \$390,600. For more information about SDIA and to see the 2010 Annual Report, visit www.susiladharma.org.

SUBUD ENTERPRISE SERVICES INTERNATIONAL (SESI)

Ruslan Morris living in Indonesia was chosen as SESI's new coordinator.

SESI had a busy year. Working under the WSA Executive, SESI started the process of identifying and encouraging the establishment of National Enterprise Representatives and how SESI may best support them.

Work continued on developing an SESI web site that will include blogs and discussion forums and, eventually, databases of enterprises and Subud specialists. Work began on the process of implementing a Micro-Finance initiative and developing a Virtual Financial Institution as a web-based financial service. SESI also started developing a voluntary shareholder's representative function for investors in the Kalimantan mining venture; established the Web Services Shop in Jakarta to support web site developments under the proprietorship of WSA and supported the WSA Subud Centres initiative.

During 2010, SESI supported the on-going work of producing a background paper on Bapak's advice and guidance concerning enterprises and the lessons learned in implementing them. This is to determine how SESI might better realize Bapak's advice and guidance concerning enterprises and "being enterprising" more completely, providing input to the WSA process started at the World Congress.

SUBUD YOUTH ACTIVITIES INTERNATIONAL (SYAI)

Leading up to the World Congress, Subud youth had many exchanges through youth networks, the WSA executive and the World Subud Council regarding the structure of international youth networking. Then after working with the international helpers (spiritual assistants), it was established that there would be two youth representatives per geographic Subud Area, one man and one woman, rather than two coordinators for the entire association, with the idea that this new structure would make the work easier. As a result the six coordinators chosen during congress were: Roland Fraval and Lucinda Young for Area 1 (Austral/Asia), both from Australia, Steven Martin and Theresa Boyd for Area 2 (Europe and Africa), both living in the UK and Miguel Bocanegra, from Colombia living in Canada, and Alexandra Woodward, USA for Area 3 (The Americas).

Following congress the youth coordinators have focused on building communication amongst themselves as well as developing channels of communication within the World Subud Council and worldwide by identifying coordinators in various countries.

The youth participated in several gatherings and events in 2010, notably in Germany, Colombia, Lithuania during the Zone 4 Gathering, the U.S. both in California and during the National Congress, Indonesia for youth anniversary celebrations, in Britain during the British Gathering and Congress, Moldova and at the Swiss Snowcamp at the end of the year. The Hamburg gathering was significant as being completely youth-run and organized. Throughout these activities and in making these connections, the coordinators suggested that spiritual support for younger members is especially needed.



The youth in Indonesia were especially active fundraising for and participating in emergency aid following the eruption of Mt. Merapi on Java in December, participating in the birthday celebrations for Bapak, Subud's founder, in June and organizing a three-day youth anniversary celebration in August, 'Tresno II Kudus 2010'. Over 50 youth attended this event that included a video workshop for disadvantaged children, disaster training, a full spiritual program and a visit to the village where Bapak was born.

The second annual Human Force Volunteer Camp was held in Mexico at the Subud project Usaha Mulia Abadi (UMA). Fourteen young people from Mexico and around the world joined forces in this collaborative effort between SDIA and Subud Youth to make site improvements and develop the project and engage in self-development activities to reflect on their lives and volunteer experience.



In December the international youth coordinators encouraged Subud members to host community dinners to fundraise for the International Youth Travel Fund (IYTF) resulting in approximately \$3000. The IYTF assists and encourages young people to take an active part in Subud activities by providing funding for travel. Reporting back and some amount of matching funding are usually required to participate.



SUBUD INTERNATIONAL CULTURAL ASSOCIATION (SICA)

Following numerous meetings and discussions about the Subud International Cultural Association (SICA) and its future, Latifah Taormina (USA) was confirmed as the new SICA chairperson during the World Congress with Helena Casbolt (Australia) and Susannah Rosenthal (USA) as vice-chairs. Latifah has been closely involved with SICA for many years and has a clear knowledge of the legal aspects of this US based international non-profit organisation.

2010 was a foundation-laying year for the organization, with Latifah and her team working to put the legal and financial aspects of SICA on firm footing and to create a network and support for culture around the Subud world. This meant, among other things, establishing a permanent board, identifying liaisons and advisors and hiring a part-time executive secretary, Pamela Werner. Additional accomplishments included revising and approving bylaws, filing tax forms, opening a bank account, establishing a virtual office and submitting grant applications. The development of a new SICA web site began, international projects were identified and two "SICA revisioning" retreats were held, one in Atlanta with key board members and others who have been active with SICA and another in the UK. Input from around the world was solicited. Historic background was reviewed including Bapak's vision and Rahayu's guidance for SICA.

Two countries continued publishing SICA journals with 'Open Views' in the UK edited by Lance Edwards and 'Let it Shine' edited by Elfrida Schragen, the SICA Chairperson for Canada. A representative sampling of activities includes SICA Germany beginning work on an internet presence, an artists' exhibition and studio space under development in the Sierra Nevada foothills of



California called 'The Hatchery', the Green Chair Gallery continuing with online exhibitions and 'The Shofar' art gallery opening in collaboration with the Jewish Center in Vilnius, Lithuania.

MUHAMMAD SUBUH FOUNDATION (MSF)

The Muhammad Subuh Foundation (MSF) honours the name of the founder of Subud, Muhammad Subuh Sumohadiwidjojo and serves to build lasting financial capacity for the Subud community with dedication to the long-term aims of the World Subud Association. Since 1996 MSF has provided nearly \$900,000 for consistent funding of projects such as the translation of Bapak's and Siti Rahayu Wiryohudoyo's (Ibu Rahayu's), talks; the WSA Archives; writing the History of Subud; the WSA Care Support Program and travel of the International Helpers.



Three new and one continuing trustee were chosen, including Samuel Simonsson from Spain, Lawrence Fryer from Germany and Shyam Wadhwa from India; the continuing trustee is Olivia Reksodipoetro from Indonesia. They join Ibu Ismana Haryono and Hannah Baerveldt whose terms continue until 2011 and 2012 respectively. Samuel was elected MSF Chair.

2010 was a time of real progress for MSF, both organizationally and in its work of providing key support to many essential parts of the international Subud community.

WSA Programs: \$60,000 grant was provided for the WSA programs previously mentioned. In addition, MSF provided a \$5,000 grant to the WSA Subud Education Fund.

Subud Halls: MSF approved a total of US\$ 78,650 as grants or loans to support acquiring, renting or renovating properties for the Subud groups in Calabar and Lagos, Nigeria; Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo; Bogota, Colombia, and Cherkassy, Ukraine.

Social Projects: MSF signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Susila Dharma International Association (SDIA) that establishes MSF as a partner in terms of supporting Subud run social projects throughout the world. For this MSF donated a total of US\$ 30,140.

Cultural Projects: MSF provided the Subud International Cultural Association (SICA) with a \$5,000 grant for the SICA website.

Improved Governance: MSF completed a thorough review of its due diligence policies and procedures with a law firm in New York to ensure that MSF is fully meeting all of its obligations as a U.S. based foundation, particularly in terms of anti-terrorism regulations and policies. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed between the WSA and MSF to ensure close cooperation and mutual support and to further strengthen this working relationship.

Communications and Donor Appreciation: MSF continued to publish a high-quality e-Newsletter; continued work on a new website; recruited and established a new international team of MSF National Liaisons; and during the 2010 Subud World Congress awarded key donors with lapel pins and presented 33 Subud groups that were funded in part by MSF to obtain or renovate their Subud house with a commemorative plaque.

ADDITIONAL WORLD SUBUD ASSOCIATION FUNCTIONS AND ACTIVITIES

WSA Archives

Milestone Archive Resolutions passed during World Congress directed the WSA to take full responsibility for funding the maintenance and preservation of the WSA Archives to the latest archival standards and especially for preserving material created by and related to Subud's founder, Muhammad Subuh Sumohadiwidjojo, or 'Bapak', as he is known. In July, 2010 the original sound recordings of Bapak's talks were transferred to a professional archival company in Brussels by the name of Memnon to begin the process of assessing the tapes. This was done with a view to digitise and preserve the original sound recordings for Subud's long term future use or reference. Amalijah Thompson, WSA Archives Co-ordinator, reported to the World Subud Council meeting in August 2010 on the cost and progress of this delicate process.



The development of an effective long term strategy to raise the necessary funds for this process as well as establishing a permanent dedicated archive fund in order to better manage the short and long term needs of the WSA Archives, including preserving Bapak's and Ibu Rahayu's Talks, has also been a focus in 2010. Dave Hitchcock, Zone 7 Representative, became the archives liaison to the World Subud Council.

WSA Care Support Program

2010 brought in an entirely new Care Support team and a new location for the coordinator. With Rayner Sutherland in Canada, the former Care Support Coordinator, taking on the Executive Director position for the Muhammad Subuh Foundation, Annabella Ashby from Britain was selected as Coordinator. Subsequently a worldwide team was developed to support the two Care Support programs, the Emergency Fund for Subud members needing one-time immediate aid and the Education Fund to assist members and their families with small grants for education and training. Sarah Becker in Chile is the Emergency Fund Coordinator and Arnaud Delune in France is the Education Fund Coordinator. Almost \$15,000 was dispersed for emergency assistance and education in 2010, with \$5,000 coming from the Muhammad Subuh Foundation for education.

Subud Publications International (SPI)

SPI had a very active year with sales at World Congress, a Subud Britain Gathering in August and regular sales amounting to 954 copies of Bapak's Talks editions totalling US \$17,413. This represented 47% of SPI's total turnover of \$36,870. The other 'best seller' was the entire collection of Bapak's Recorded Talks in MP3 format, a 21 disc set, with nine sets sold for a total of \$3,309.

Regarding the Bapak's Talks volumes project, one English language edition, Volume 21, was published in July. The Russian language translation team also made good progress during 2010: Volume 18 was published, Volume 19 was completed for print, and the translation for Volume 20 was in progress. The SPI websites www.subudbooks.net and www.subudbooks.com continue to serve as online bookstores. In 2010 134 units of Bapak's and Ibu's Talks, both printed and recorded, were sold from the 'net' website. 'A Talk a Week' is housed here and continues to be available through a free sign-up function.

Subud International Health Association (SIHA)

Dr Abdurachman Mitchell from Australia took on the role of coordinator for SIHA during the World Congress with the aim of further developing this association of health professionals. SIHA continues to serve the interests and needs of Subud members who are concerned with the relationship between health and spirituality



and facilitates connections among practitioners with similar interests. Abdurrachman met with Matthew D'haemer, SIHA vice-chair, and together they developed short and long term goals such as continuing to update the SIHA website and building and managing their contacts.



Subud, The Environment And Sustainable Development

2010 continued to see numerous efforts made by Subud groups to 'green' their premises. Through affiliates and partner foundations members continued to focus on world issues and concerns such as sustainable community development (Millennium Development Goals), mercury contamination, responsible tourism and carbon foot printing.

Two Subud member's projects were recognized this year: Kalimantan Tour Destinations was nominated for the Responsible Tour Operator Award at the World Travel Market in London and Nancy (Nathanya) Coonridge received an Organic Farmer of the Year Award from the New Mexico Organic Commodity Commission.



Kalimantan Investment Corporation (KIC) And Kalimantan Gold Corporation (KGC)

This Kalimantan Investment Corporation, originally set up to manage Subud members' investments in the mining exploration activities in Kalimantan, was closed following a shareholder vote. KIC shares were transformed into shares in Kalimantan Gold Corporation (KGC) and split from one to four. KGC owns two mining exploration concessions in Kalimantan; the Kalimantan Surya Kencana (KSK) contract of work in Central Kalimantan for copper and gold and the PT Jelai Cahaya Minerals concession in East Kalimantan for gold.

In December 2010 two mining agreements were signed. One was an option agreement between KGC and Freeport -McMoran on the PT KSK concession in which Freeport would eventually provide funding for the mining venture and the social projects under Yayasan Tambuhak Sinta (YTS). YTS imbeds most of the Subud mining development in Kalimantan. This is calculated at approximately 7% of operating budgets which likely will run into a tens of millions dollars annually over the next several years. If the opportunity materializes and the decision to mine is taken, KGC will be the operator and will carry out all physical operations.

Under the second agreement with Tigers Realm Minerals Pty Ltd. for the Jelai gold project, Tigers must spend US\$6 million by the IUP (Indonesian exploration license) expiry in June 2015, in return for a 70% equity stake. Tigers will use best commercial endeavours to arrange finance for 100% of the KGC funding required throughout the project. YTS community development programs are also funded under this agreement.

Value is not reflected in the financial statements for donated services, although significant amounts of time are provided. For this report, we thank Graphic Solutions in the USA for the design.

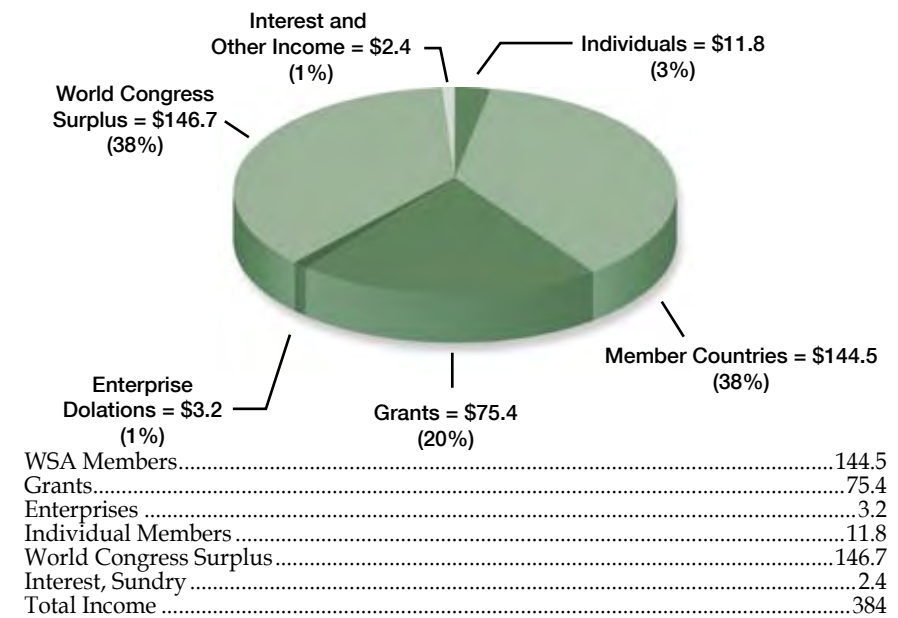

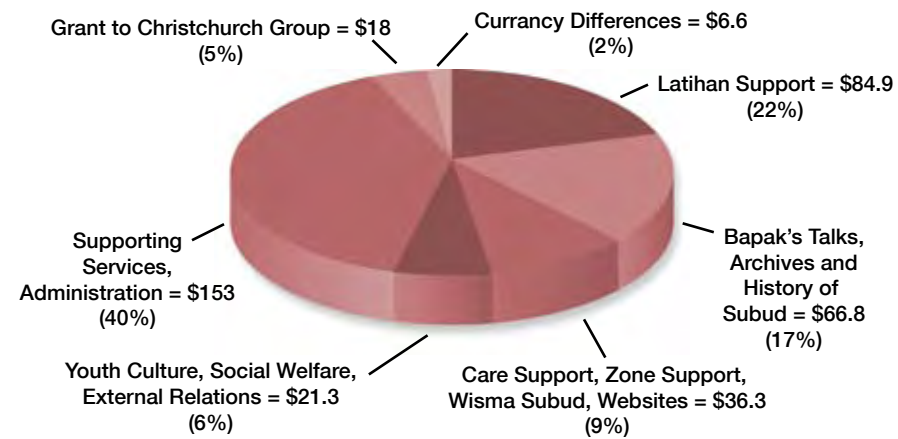
